



MARY STUART ROGERS • 1918-1993

Born January 10, 1918, Mary Stuart Rogers was raised in California's San Mateo County, south of San Francisco. She later lived in Santa Cruz before settling with her husband in Modesto. A lifelong homemaker, she was the mother of two sons and two daughters. One son, the late James W. Rogers, graduated from Lewis & Clark College in 1964.

The interests of the Mary Stuart Rogers Foundation in the homeless, battered women, and education closely reflect the interests of its founder. Mary Stuart Rogers was very attentive to world affairs and deeply committed to providing opportunities—particularly educational opportunities—to needy individuals motivated to succeed. The foundation contributes to youth and other human service programs, medical research, and education from the elementary through university levels.

The foundation has also established endowed professorships in music and education and a faculty-student summer science research program at Lewis & Clark College. The foundation's most recent gift to Lewis & Clark College funded the remodeling of the building now named Rogers Hall, which houses the Graduate School of Education.

THE MARY STUART ROGERS SCHOLARSHIP

Established at Lewis & Clark College in 1995, the Mary Stuart Rogers Scholarship honors students whose outstanding academic achievements are complemented by qualities of leadership, dedication, integrity, compassion, sensitivity, and self-discipline. Scholarships are awarded annually to juniors and seniors in the College of Arts and Sciences and to students in the Graduate School of Education who are pursuing a master of arts in teaching.

ELIGIBILITY

To qualify for the Mary Stuart Rogers Scholarship as an undergraduate, a student must:

- Be a full-time junior or senior in the College of Arts and Sciences and apply during the academic year prior to the award year.
- Carry a grade point average of at least 3.2.
- Possess personal qualities of dedication, integrity, compassion, sensitivity, self-discipline, and leadership.
- Demonstrate financial need according to federal and institutional eligibility criteria.

All recipients of the Mary Stuart Rogers Scholarship are required to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.2 during the award year(s).

AWARDS

Undergraduate awards are up to \$5,000 per academic year. All recipients also receive a ring to commemorate their designation as a Rogers scholar. As part of the scholarship program, recipients are honored at an annual banquet held at Lewis & Clark College and hosted by the Mary Stuart Rogers Foundation.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Each year students who meet the class standing, GPA, and financial need criteria are invited to apply for the Mary Stuart Rogers Scholarship. Students who apply for the scholarship must submit a faculty recommendation and two essays. (The essay topics will be included in the invitation letter.) Please contact Student Financial Services Office for further information about the application process.

SELECTION

The director of Student Financial Services will review undergraduate application materials, along with academic and financial records, to determine an applicant's eligibility. Eligible applications will be reviewed by a scholarship committee appointed by the dean of the College. Award winners will be determined by a combination of criteria, including scholastic achievement, financial need, letters of application, and faculty recommendations.

CONTINUING SUPPORT

The Mary Stuart Rogers Scholarship may be renewed for one year without reapplication by undergraduate recipients, provided they maintain full-time enrollment status and continue to meet all other scholastic and eligibility requirements. However, recipients must inform the Office of Student Financial Services that they desire to renew their award. Students who receive the award as undergraduates may apply for the scholarship if they enter Lewis & Clark's graduate program in teacher education, provided they meet all other eligibility criteria. Undergraduate awards are generally limited to two years; graduate awards are for a single year and are not renewable.
