Mr. Solomon examines Section 6217 of the Coastal Zone Act Reauthorization Amendments of 1990 and the inadequate development of state nonpoint pollution programs. He argues that, unless Congress makes section 6217 part of a mandatory nonpoint pollution control system, it will not adequately protect coastal waters from pollution because states do not currently have enough incentive to fully implement the program. The author concludes that it is unlikely that Congress will restructure section 6217 enough to allow it to achieve its goal of protecting coastal waters from nonpoint pollution.
