Program Design:

India's 5000-year history and current importance in the international socio/political scene provides an environment that is rich for intellectual inquiry. Program sites are in the north and south of India with extended stays in New Delhi, Dehra Dun, Varanasi, and Bangalore. The program starts in New Delhi under the direction of Dr. Sharada Nayak, Managing Director of the Educational Resource Trust. and Dr. Sunil Kumar, a professor in the History Department at Delhi University. The study begins with a comprehensive three week introduction to India and an academic focus on medieval history. This focus is complemented with field trips within New Delhi and trips to Tughluqabad, the Taj Mahal, and Fatehpur Sikri.

From Delhi the program moves

to Navdanya Environmental
Center near the city of Dehra
Dun to explore environmental
issues that confront India today.
Navdanya is an environmental
organization founded by Dr.
Vandana Shiva to work with
people in agriculture to
maximize production while
minimizing the impact on the
environment.

Varanasi, one of the holiest cities of India, is the third site of study. The Centre for Postcolonial Education at Southpoint School, under the direction of Dr. Nita Kumar, coordinates the study of Hinduism and artisans in the community of Varanasi. The group will identify a community project that will provide some benefit to the host community.

From Varanasi the academic program moves to Bangalore in south India. Bangalore is an international center for software companies that demonstrates the effects of globalization in modern India.

Within the program are two, week long, independent travel opportunities designed to have students explore areas of India not included in the formal itinerary and to assume responsibility for moving about and exploring India on their own in small groups. Students will be expected to contribute to the learning of the group by sharing their observations and analysis of issues discussed within journals and written papers throughout the program.
