**Program Design:**

This geographically diverse country in South America offers an exciting location for a summer program with a major focus on the history, culture and social issues of the region.

Following an orientation program in Quito, the program will be based in Cuenca, a colonial city founded by the Spaniards in the 16<sup>th</sup> century. Program features include intensive Spanish language study at the beginning to intermediate levels. Students live with host families while in Cuenca.

**Requirements Fulfilled:**

Students who enroll in Spanish 201 may fulfill the foreign language requirement. Fulfills the area-culture study requirement of the two-course international studies requirement.

**Credits:**

3 courses per semester/12 credits

**Curriculum:****IS 241: Contemporary****Ecuador:**

This course explores different aspects of Ecuador through an anthropological optic. The main purpose is to provide students with information, conceptual tools, and methods with which to investigate and interpret their Ecuadorian experience. Class discussion and questions from students are very important.

The specific topics covered in the course are chosen anew each semester, in order to address current affairs and new anthropological work.

Globalization, Andean prehistory, traditional medicine, identity politics, indigenous rights movements, gender roles, religion and society, race, ethnicity, witchcraft, agricultural economics, transnational migration and Plan Colombia are some of the topics included in recent courses. Social structure and culture in Cuenca are also included.

The course includes day trips and a weeklong fieldtrip.

Course material is presented in required readings and class lectures. Grades are based on exams, short writing assignments, and a term paper.

**Dr. Lynn Hirschkind, Director of Content Courses component of program.**

Dr. Hirschkind first saw Ecuador in 1971, when she was 21 years old, during one of her stints as a college drop-out. After a year in Quito, she went on to see the rest of South America, spending another two years before deciding finally and definitively to finish school. That decision took her

through a PH.D. in anthropology in 1980. She returned to Cuenca, Ecuador to carry out her dissertation field research, from 1978 to 1980. In 1982 she bought a ranch, between four and countless hours northeast of Cuenca; weather and road and political conditions played constant havoc with the time/distance ratio. There, for 17 years, she raised sheep and cows, made yarn and cheese, and acquired many godchildren. During this time she began giving lectures to Lewis and Clark College students. Eventually the lectures grew into a formal anthropology course, and Lynn began to organize a complete academic program, including a history or ecology course, field trips and speakers. The purpose of the academic program is to offer students a broad and deep knowledge of Ecuador, one that enhances the experiential impressions gained from living here while also providing conceptual and analytic tools with which to interpret this deluge of information. To this end, the anthropology class is reinvented each semester with different emphases and content, and the history or ecology class has likewise changed focus each year, from geography to art to conservation.

**Ms. Narcisa Ullauri, Resident Director.**

Ms. Ullauri is a native of Cuenca, Ecuador. She holds a bachelor's degree in Social Communication from Universidad de Cuenca and two master's degrees, one in Education Communication from Universidad Politécnica and the other in Cultural Studies from Universidad del Azuay. She has a diverse background in her work experience, ranging from being a professional tour guide in Ecuador, to being a professor at Universidad

del Azuay, where she also is a member of the Academic Council in the Philosophy department. Ms. Ullauri is responsible for all aspects for the program ranging from homestay placement, arranging academic excursions, and assuring the well being of program participants.

**Ms. Mayra Cardoso, Director of Spanish Language component of program.**

Ms. Cardoso received her degree in Education from Universidad Estatal de Cuenca from the Philosophy Department. She updates her teaching skills by attending education workshops sponsored by Oxford University Cambridge. She has taught Spanish to Brazilians at Colegio Pitágoras, was the Academic Coordinator for Spanish and English sections at Centro Binacional Abraham Lincoln de Cuenca. She has been the Director for Spanish component of the Lewis & Clark College program since 1994. She is also responsible for the recruitment and retention of Spanish language instructors, organizing other aspects of the program such as sports activities, conferences, meals and other duties as they become necessary.
